**Private Sector and Government Over-The-Month Job Gains Below Post-Recession Average**

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Arizona was 7.9% in April, for the third consecutive month. The U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased one-tenth of a percentage point from 7.6% in March to 7.5% in April. A year ago the Arizona seasonally adjusted rate was 8.4% and the U.S. rate was 8.1%. (see **Figure 1**).

Arizona gained 5,200 Nonfarm jobs (0.2%) in April (see **Figure 2**). This gain is less than the average post-recession ('10-'12) gain (7,500 jobs) but slightly above the 10 year average ('03-'12) for April of 4,600 jobs. Private Sector gained 4,200 jobs, lower than the average post-recessionary gains ('10-'12) of 5,600 jobs. However, these gains were slightly above the historical average of 3,600 jobs ('03-'12). Gains in Government (1,000 jobs) were also lower than the average post-recessionary gains ('10-'12) of 1,900 jobs.



**Over the Month by Industry Sector**

Six of the eleven major sectors had gains, four had losses, and one was flat (see **Figure 3**). Professional and Business Services recorded the largest over-the-month gain (3,100 jobs), while Other Services recorded the largest job loss (-1,000 jobs).

**Professional and Business Services (PBS)** gained 3,100 jobs (0.9%), nearly twice the average ten-year ('03-'12) gain of 1,600 jobs (0.5%) and considerably higher than the post-recessionary average ('10-'12) of 1,300 jobs. Driving gains in **PBS** was Professional, Scientific and Technical Services which added 2,400 jobs, the largest over-the-month gain since October 2007 (3,100 jobs). Administrative and Support and Waste added 700 jobs while Management of Companies and Enterprises was flat. Within Administrative and Support and Waste, Services to Buildings and Dwellings gained 1,400 jobs, while Employment Services and Business Support Services lost 800 jobs and 400 jobs

respectively.

**Financial Activities** had the second largest gain of 1,400 jobs (0.8%). This gain is large compared to the average ten-year ('03-'12) gain of 300 jobs and post-recessionary average ('10-'12) loss of 300 jobs. Finance and Insurance added 1,100 jobs and Real Estate and Rental and Leasing added 300 jobs. All gains in Finance and Insurance came from Credit Intermediation and Related Activities (1,500 jobs), which experienced the largest over-the-month gain since April 2004. Securities, Commodity Contracts was flat and Insurance Carriers and Related Activities shed 400 jobs.

**Trade, Transportation and Utilities**

(TTU) gained 1,300 jobs (0.3%), higher than the post-recessionary average ('10-'12) gain of 600 jobs. While the ten-year average ('03-'12) is a loss of 800 jobs, this sector has seen wide swings with gains in some years and losses in others.

Employment changes in April range from a gain of 4,200 jobs in 1993 to a loss of 5,500 jobs in 2009. In April, all gains were driven by Retail Trade which added 2,100 jobs. Within Retail Trade, Motor Vehicles and Parts gained 500 jobs, Building Material and Garden Supply gained 500 jobs, and General Merchandise gained 700 jobs with the remaining gains in unreported sectors. Wholesale Trade lost 500 jobs. Transportation, Warehousing, and Utilities lost an additional 300 jobs.


**Government** gained 1,000 jobs (0.2%). Gains in Federal (500 jobs) and State Government (600 jobs) were slightly offset by losses in Local Government (-100 jobs).

**Education and Health Services (EHS)** gained 700 jobs, comparable to the post-recessionary average ('10-'12) gain of 600 jobs. However, these gains were below the historical average ('03-'12) of 1,200 jobs. Within **EHS**, Educational Services lost 300 jobs but Health Care (400 jobs) and Social Assistance (600 jobs) added jobs. All gains in Health Care were from Ambulatory Health Care Services (600 jobs), Hospitals was flat, and Nursing and Residential Care Facilities lost 200 jobs

**Natural Resources and Mining (NRM)** gained 100 jobs, all of it from Metal Ore Mining.

**Leisure and Hospitality (L&H)** was flat for the second consecutive April. Compared to April's over-the-month performance, the post-recessionary average ('10-'12) for April is considerably higher (2,100 jobs) and so is the ten-year ('03-'12) average (1,900 jobs). No job gain in April might be the result of higher-than-average hiring in March. In March 2013 and 2012, **L&H** sector reported a gain of 7,000 jobs, considerably higher than their ten year average (average March gain of 5,000 jobs ('03-'12)). While

Accommodation gained 900 jobs, Food Services and Drinking Places lost 900 jobs. Arts, Entertainment and Recreation sector was flat over-the-month.


Among the major sectors, **Other Services** had the largest loss of 1,000 jobs. **Information** lost 900 jobs, all in unreported sectors. Telecommunications, the only reported sector, was flat over-the-month. This loss is typical even years in which the economy is expanding.

**Manufacturing** shed 400 jobs, all of which were from Durable Goods. Within Durable Goods, Fabricated Metals gained 100 jobs while Computer and Electronic Parts lost 100 jobs. Aerospace Products and Parts was flat over-the-month. The remaining losses were in unreported sectors within Durable Goods. Nondurable Goods was flat over the month.

**Construction** lost 100 jobs. Historically, Construction has gained more than it has lost in April. Both Specialty Trades (700 jobs) and Heavy Construction (100 jobs) gained jobs. The losses in Building Construction (-900 jobs) were higher than the post-recession average ('10-'12) loss of 100 jobs. Building Construction was flat over the ten year period ('03-'12).

### Over the Year

In April, Arizona gained 48,300 (2.0%) Nonfarm jobs over-the-year. The Private Sector gained 44,200 jobs over the year while Government gained the remaining 4,100 jobs. Of the eleven major sectors, ten recorded employment gains while only one sector, Other Services, lost jobs (see Figure 4).



**Leisure and Hospitality (L&H)** added 9,800 jobs (3.6%), the largest over the year employment growth among the eleven sectors. Accommodation and Food Services accounted for the majority of these gains, adding 7,000 jobs. Within Accommodation and Food Services, gains in Food Services and Drinking Places (7,400 jobs) were offset by losses in Accommodation (-400 jobs). Arts, Entertainment and Recreation added 2,800 jobs, the largest over-the-year April employment gain on record (1991-2013).

**Construction** gained 7,300 jobs (6.5%) with all three subsectors adding jobs. Specialty Trades added the majority of the jobs (5,000 jobs), followed by Heavy (1,600 jobs) and Building (700 jobs) Construction.

**Professional and Business Services (PBS)** added 7,100 jobs. The majority of the PBS gains occurred in Administrative and Support and Waste (4,600 jobs). Within this sector, Services to Buildings and Dwellings (1,300 jobs), Employment Services (300 jobs), and Business Support Services (100 jobs) also

recorded gains. Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services added 2,600 jobs while Management of Companies and Enterprises shed 100 jobs. This is the second consecutive month of over-the-year job losses in Management of Companies and Enterprises, which had not previously recorded over-the-year losses since December 2010.

**Financial Activities** gained 6,900 jobs (3.9%). This is the largest over-the-year employment gain since August 2006. Finance and Insurance added 5,400 jobs. All three subsectors within Finance and Insurance recorded job growth. The majority of the gains were in Credit Intermediation and Related Activities (2,800 jobs), followed by Insurance Carriers and Related Activities (2,400 jobs), and Securities, Commodity Contracts (200 jobs). Real Estate and Rental and Leasing also recorded over-the-year job growth of 1,500 jobs.

**Education and Health Services (EHS)** added 6,700 jobs (1.8%). All of the gains in EHS came from Health Care (6,500 jobs) and Social Assistance (1,500 jobs). Educational Services recorded its sixth consecutive month of over-the-year loss, shedding 1,300 jobs. Within Health Care, Ambulatory Health Care Services (5,400 jobs) and Nursing and Residential Care Facilities (1,100 jobs) gained jobs, while Hospitals remained flat.

**Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (TTU)** added 6,000 jobs (1.3%). Gains in Wholesale Trade (4,500 jobs) and Retail Trade (2,700 jobs) were offset by losses in Transportation, Warehousing and Utilities (-1,200 jobs). Wholesale Trade recorded its fourth consecutive month of over-the-year job growth above 4.5%. Transportation and Warehousing lost 1,200 jobs while Utilities remained flat.

**Government** gained 4,100 jobs (1.0%). Job gains were reported in State (3,900 jobs) and Local (1,100 jobs) Government sectors. Within these sectors, increases in employment primarily occurred within State (3,400 jobs) and Local (2,100 jobs) Government Education. Losses in unreported, non-education sectors were observed (-1,000 jobs). These gains were offset by losses within Federal Government (-900 jobs).

Other sectors that gained jobs over-the-year included **Information** (600 jobs), **Manufacturing** (400 jobs) and **Natural Resource and Mining** (300 jobs). Job gains within Manufacturing were from gains in Nondurable Goods (400 jobs). **Other Services** (-900 jobs) shed jobs. Other Services has recorded over-the-year losses for 22 consecutive months (June 2011-April 2013).

## Summary

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Arizona was 7.9% in April, for the third consecutive month. The U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased one-tenth of a percentage point from 7.6% in March to 7.5% in April. A year ago, the Arizona seasonally adjusted rate was 8.4% and the U.S. rate was 8.1%. Arizona added 5,200 Nonfarm jobs (0.2%) to payrolls over the month with the Private Sector adding 4,200 jobs and Government adding 1,000 jobs. Both, Private Sector and Government gains were lower than the average post-recessionary gains ('10-'12) of 5,600 jobs and 1,900 jobs respectively. Six of the eleven major sectors added jobs, one was flat, and four sectors reported losses.

Professional and Business Services recorded the largest over-the-month employment gain (3,100 jobs, 0.9%), nearly twice the average ten-year ('03-'12) gain of 1,600 jobs (0.5%) and more than twice the post-recessionary average ('10-'12) of 1,300 jobs.


Financial Activities gained 1,400 jobs. This gain was relatively large compared to the average ten-year ('03-'12) gain of 300 jobs (0.2%) and post-recessionary average ('10-'12) loss of 300 jobs. Trade, Transportation and Utilities gained 1,300 jobs, higher than the post-recessionary average ('10-'12) gain of 600 jobs. While the ten-year average ('03-'12) is a loss of 800 jobs, this sector has seen wide swings with gains in some years and losses in others. Government gained 1,000 jobs (0.2%). Gains in Federal (500 jobs) and State Government (600 jobs) were slightly offset by losses in Local Government (-100 jobs). Employment gains were also recorded in Education and Health Services (700 jobs) and were comparable to the post-recessionary average ('10-'12) gain of 600 jobs. However, these gains were below the historical average ('03-'12) of 1,200 jobs. The Natural Resources and Mining sector gained 100 jobs.

Leisure and Hospitality was flat for the second consecutive April. Compared to April's over-the-month performance, the post-recessionary average ('10-'12) for April is considerably higher (2,100 jobs) and so is the ten-year ('03-'12) average (1,900 jobs). No job gain in April might be the result of higher than average hiring in March. The sectors with job losses included Other Services (-1,000 jobs), Information (-900 jobs), Manufacturing (-400 jobs), and Construction (-100 jobs).


Arizona gained 48,300 (2.0%) Nonfarm jobs over-the-year in April. The Private Sector accounted for 44,200 of the total job gain while Government added the remaining 4,100 jobs. Ten of the eleven major sectors recorded job gains while only one sector lost jobs. Leisure and Hospitality recorded the largest employment gain (9,800 jobs). The remaining major sectors that recorded job gains include: Construction (7,300 jobs); Professional and Business Services (7,100 jobs); Financial Activities (6,900 jobs); Education and Health Services (6,700 jobs); Trade, Transportation and Utilities (6,000 jobs); Government (4,100 jobs); Information (600 jobs); Manufacturing (400 jobs); and Natural Resources and Mining (300 jobs). Other Services recorded the largest loss (-900 jobs).


**Arizona & U.S. Unemployment Rate  
Seasonally Adjusted**




**Arizona & U.S. Nonfarm Employment

Year-to-Year Percent Change**






**Arizona & U.S. Manufacturing Employment
