Above Average Government Gains; Leisure & Hospitality Lead Private Sector Gains

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Arizona decreased one-tenth of a percentage point from 8.0% in January to 7.9% in February. The U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased two-tenths of a percentage point from 7.9% in January to 7.7% in February. A year ago the Arizona seasonally adjusted rate was 8.4%, and the U.S. rate was 8.3% (see **Figure 1**).

In February, an additional 22,900 Nonfarm jobs (0.9%) were added to payrolls in Arizona (see **Figure 2**). Job gains are typical in February which has a ten-year ('03-'12) average job gain of 26,300 jobs.

The Government Sector accounted for more than half the gains (14,700 jobs) in February. Most of these gains were reported in Local Public Education (12,200 jobs) and State Public Education (2,400 jobs) as schools returned to full staffing levels following the holiday break. The Private Sector added 8,200 jobs, below the ten-year ('03-'12) average gain of 12,500 jobs.



Over the Month by Industry Sector

Nine-of-the-eleven major sectors added jobs, one was flat, and one reported losses (see **Figure 3**). The two largest over-the-month gains were in Government (14,700 jobs) and Leisure and Hospitality (5,600 jobs). Together they accounted for more than 75.0% of all job gains.

Government recorded the largest over-the-month gain posting 14,700 jobs (3.6%). Gains are typical in February but were higher than the ten-year ('03-'12) average job gain of 13,800 jobs. Major drivers of Government job gains were from Local Public Education (12,200 jobs) and State Public Education (2,400 jobs). The balance of job gains were from Non-Education in State and Local Government; Federal Government was flat.

Leisure and Hospitality added 5,600 jobs (2.1%). This gain is higher than the ten-year ('03-

'12) average gain of 4,900 jobs. Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation gained 2,000 jobs, more than double the ten-year ('03-'12) average job gain of 900 jobs. Accommodation and Food Services gained 3,600 jobs all of which were from Food Services and Drinking Places (3,600 jobs). Accommodation was flat in a month which typically ('03-'12 average) gains 800 jobs.

Financial Activities gained 1,900 jobs (1.1%), better than the ten-year ('03-'12) average gain of 1,100 jobs. Finance and Insurance recorded a gain of 1,200 jobs and Real Estate and Rental and Leasing added 700 jobs.

Professional and Business Services added 1,500 jobs, less than half the ten-year ('03-'12) average of 3,300 jobs. Professional, Scientific and Technical Services and Management of Companies and Enterprises added 1,700 jobs and 100 jobs respectively. Administrative and Support and Waste lost 300 jobs during a month in which the ten-year ('03-'12) average gain is 1,800 jobs. The largest loss within Administrative and Waste Services occurred in Employment Services (-1,000 jobs). Employment Services has an average ten-year ('03-'12) gain of 1,100 jobs and has recorded only two other losses in February ('09 & '10). Business Support Services reported a loss of 100 jobs and Services to Buildings and Dwellings added 300 jobs.


Construction reported a gain of 1,100 jobs (0.9%). This is nearly 3 times the ten-year ('03-'12) average of 400 jobs. All gains came from Specialty Trades which added 1,500 jobs, 5 times the ten-year ('03-'12) average gain of 300 jobs. Heavy and Building Construction both reported over-the-month losses of 100 jobs and 300 jobs respectively.

Education and Health Services added only 400 jobs in February (0.1%). The EHS ten-year ('03-'12) average gain is 2,900 jobs. Gains in Educational Services (1,300 jobs) were offset by losses in Health Care (-1,000 jobs). Social Assistance had a small gain of 100 jobs. This is the first recorded loss in Health Care which typically gains ('03-'12 average) jobs in February. The losses in Health Care stem from Ambulatory Health Care Services which shed 1,400 jobs. This is only the second reported loss in Ambulatory Health Care Services for the month of February since 1990. Health Care typically gains ('03-'12 average) 900 jobs. Hospitals (100 jobs) and Nursing and Residential Care Facilities (300 jobs) reported gains.

Information (600 jobs), **Manufacturing** (200 jobs), and **Other Services** (100 jobs) also added jobs in the month of February. Gains in Other Services was less than the ten-year ('03-'12) average gain of 1,100 jobs. **Natural Resources and Mining** was flat over the month.


Over-the-Month Job Gain/Loss by Sector, in thousands



Trade, Transportation and Utilities lost 3,200 jobs (-0.7%). February losses in TTU are typical though larger than the ten-year ('03-'12) average loss of 1,800 jobs. Transportation, Warehousing & Utilities added 300 jobs. Losses in Retail Trade (5,000 jobs) more than doubled the average ('03-'12) loss of 2,200 jobs. The majority of losses within Retail were from Clothing and Accessories (-1,100 jobs), General Merchandise (-2,200 jobs), and unreported subsectors (-2,000 jobs). Wholesale Trade gained 1,500 jobs over the month, more than triple the average ('03-'12) gain of 400 jobs. Trade overall had a net loss of 3,500 jobs.

Over the Year

Arizona gained 48,900 (2.0%) Nonfarm jobs over the year in February. This was the 9th consecutive month of over-the-year Nonfarm employment growth at or above 2.0%. The Private Sector gained 42,400 jobs while Government gained the remaining 6,500 jobs over the year. Ten-of-the-eleven major sectors recorded employment gains while only one sector, Other Services, lost jobs (see Figure 4).



Leisure and Hospitality (L&H) added 9,300 jobs (3.5%), the largest over-the-year gain among the eleven sectors.

Accommodations and Food Services accounted for the majority of these gains, adding 6,900 jobs. Within Accommodation and Food Services, gains in Food Services and Drinking Places (7,700 jobs) were offset by losses in Accommodations (-800 jobs). Arts, Entertainment and Recreation added 2,400 jobs; the largest over-the-year gain since March 2007.

Construction gained 8,400 jobs (7.7%) with all three subsectors adding jobs. Specialty Trades added 4,400 jobs while Buildings and Heavy Construction both gained 2,000 jobs. Construction has gained 11,300 jobs since reaching its post-recession employment low in February 2011.

Financial Activities gained 6,500 jobs (3.7%). This is the fourth consecutive month of over-the-year growth above 3.0%. Finance and Insurance added 5,200 jobs, from growth within Credit Intermediation and Related Activities (2,900 jobs), Insurance Carriers and Related Activities (2,200 jobs), and Securities, Commodity Contracts (100 jobs). Real Estate and Rental and Leasing also recorded over-the-year job growth of 1,300 jobs.

Government gained 6,500 jobs (1.5%). Increases in employment primarily occurred within State (4,500 jobs) and Local (2, 900 jobs) Government Education. This is the ninth consecutive month of over-the-year job gains in Local Government Education. Overall, State Government gained 5,100 jobs while Local Government gained 2,100 jobs. These gains were offset by losses within Federal Government (700 jobs). Federal Government has not seen over-the-year job growth since December 2010.

Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (TTU) employment increased 1.2% over the year, adding 5,500 jobs. Gains in Wholesale Trade (5,900 jobs) and Retail (400 jobs) Trade were offset by losses in Transportation, Warehousing and Utilities (-800 jobs). Wholesale Trade recorded its largest over-the-year percentage gain (6.2%) since April 1998. Wholesale Trade's February increase continues an upward trend in over-the-year gains observed since April 2012. Transportation and Warehousing lost 800 jobs while Utilities remained flat.

Professional and Business Services (PBS) added 5,500 jobs. The majority of the PBS gains occurred in Administrative and Support and Waste (3,100 jobs). Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (1,900 jobs) and Management of Companies and Enterprises (500 jobs) also recorded gains. Employment Services shed 100 jobs. This is the first over-the-year loss within Employment Services since December 2010. Business Support Services and Services to Buildings and Dwellings both gained 700 jobs.

Education and Health Services (EHS) added 3,800 jobs (1.0%). All of the gains in EHS came from Health Care (4,700 jobs) and Social Assistance (1,300 jobs). Educational Services recorded its fourth consecutive month of over-the-year losses shedding 2,200 jobs since February 2012. Within Health Care, Ambulatory Health Care Services had a 3,900 job gain while Nursing and Residential Care Facilities had a gain of 1,400 jobs. The trend in Hospitals over-the-year growth has been declining since February 2012. In December 2012, Hospitals reported negative growth (below zero) for the first time since July 2001. This trend has continued through February 2012.

Manufacturing gained 1,900 jobs with Durable (1,700 jobs) and Nondurable (200 jobs) both adding jobs. **Information** (1,800 jobs) and **Natural Resources and Mining** (300 jobs) gained jobs while **Other Services** (-600 jobs) shed jobs. Other Services has not recorded over-the-year gains since June 2011.





The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Arizona decreased one-tenth of a percentage point from 8.0% in January to 7.9% in February. The U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased two-tenths of a percentage point from 7.9% in January to 7.7% in February. A year ago the Arizona seasonally adjusted rate was 8.4%, and the U.S. rate was 8.3%. In February, an additional 22,900 Nonfarm jobs (0.9%) were added to payrolls in Arizona over the month. The Government Sector accounted for more than half of the gains (14,700 jobs) in February. The Private Sector added 8,200 jobs, slightly below the ten-year ('03-'12) average gain of 12,500 jobs. Nine of the eleven major sectors added jobs, one was flat, and one sector reported losses.

Over the month, the largest gains in Government were reported in Local Public Education (12,200 jobs) and some in State Public Education (2,400 jobs) as schools returned to full staff levels following the holiday break. Most of these gains Leisure and Hospitality added 5,600 jobs (2.1%). This gain is only slightly above the ten-year ('03-'12) average gain of 4,900 jobs. Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation

gained 2,000 jobs, more than double the ten-year ('03-'12) average job gain of 900 jobs. Financial Activities gained 1,900 jobs (1.1%), better than the ten-year ('03-'12) average gain of 1,100 jobs. Professional and Business Services added 1,500 jobs, less than half the ten-year ('03-'12) average of 3,300 jobs. Construction reported a gain of 1,100 jobs (0.9%), nearly 3 times its the ten-year ('03-'12) average of 400 jobs. All gains came from Specialty Trades which added 1,500 jobs. Information (600 jobs), Education and Health Services (400 jobs), Manufacturing (200 jobs), and Other Services (100 jobs) also recorded positive gains. Natural Resource and Mining remained flat while Trade, Transportation and Utilities (-3,200 jobs) lost jobs.

Over the year, Arizona gained 48,900 (2.0%) Nonfarm jobs in February. The Private Sector accounted for 42,400 of the total job growth while Government gained the remaining 6,500 jobs. Ten of the eleven major sectors recorded employment gains while only one lost jobs. Leisure and Hospitality recorded the largest employment gain (9,300 jobs), while Other Services recorded the largest loss (-600 jobs). The remaining major sectors that recorded positive job growth include: Construction (8,400 jobs); Financial Activities (6,500 jobs); Government (6,500 jobs); Trade, Transportation and Utilities (5,500 jobs); Professional and Business Services (5,500 jobs); Education and Health Services (3,800 jobs); Manufacturing (1,900 jobs); Information (1,800 jobs); and Natural Resources and Mining (300 jobs).




**Arizona & U.S. Retail Trade
Year-to-Year Percent Change**




**Arizona & U.S. Employment Services
