Fewer Nonfarm Job Losses in January; Unemployment Rate Unchanged

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Arizona remained unchanged in January at 6.6% after a downward revision in December's unemployment rate of 6.7% to 6.6%. The U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased one-tenth of a percentage point from 5.6% in December to 5.7% in January. A year ago, the Arizona seasonally adjusted rate was 7.1% and the U.S. rate was 6.6% (see **Figure 1**).

Arizona shed 43,300 Nonfarm jobs (-1.6%) over the month in January (see **Figure 2**). Job losses in January are typical in Arizona as firms reduce staff levels following the holiday months. The ten-year average ('05-'14) Nonfarm employment loss in January was 58,000 jobs. The post-recessionary average ('10-'14) Nonfarm employment loss for January was 51,100. The Private sector accounted for most of the losses with 30,800 jobs; Government lost the remaining 12,500 jobs.



Over the Month by Industry Sector

Employment numbers are seasonally unadjusted. Employment numbers reported this month are the January finalized numbers, unlike the past where we have reported January preliminary numbers. Eight of the eleven major sectors lost jobs in January. (**See Figure 3**). Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (-18,100 jobs), Government (-12,500 jobs), and Professional Business Services (-7,200 jobs) accounted for the majority of the job losses. Education and Health Services (-2,400 jobs), Financial Activities (-2,300 jobs), Manufacturing (-1,400 jobs), Information (-900 jobs) and Natural Resources and Mining (-200 jobs) had relatively smaller job losses. Construction (100 jobs) and Other Services (1,600 jobs) gained jobs. Leisure and Hospitality was flat over the month.

**Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (TTU)** lost 18,100 jobs (-3.5%) over the month in January, which was slightly above the post-recessionary ('10-'14) average loss of 16,700 jobs.

Retail Trade accounted for a large share (-14,000 jobs) of Trade’s overall loss of 15,800 jobs. Wholesale Trade lost the remaining 1,800 jobs. Losses within Retail Trade include: General Merchandise (-6,200 jobs), Clothing & Accessories (-3,500 jobs), Food & Beverage (-900 jobs), and Furniture and Home Furnishings (-600 jobs). Motor Vehicles and Parts remained flat while Building Material, Garden Supply gained 100 jobs. Transportation, Warehousing, and Utilities lost 2,300 jobs over the month. Of those jobs, Transportation and Warehousing lost 2,200 jobs; Utilities lost 100 jobs. Although the majority of the losses within Transportation and Warehousing were in unreported sectors, the reported sectors of Truck Transportation (-600 jobs) and Air Transportation (-200 jobs) also had losses.

**Government** posted a loss of 12,500 jobs over the month (-3.0%). All levels of Government posted losses. The majority of the losses came from Local Government (-11,300 jobs) primarily within Local Government Education (-9,500 jobs). Local Government Education losses were higher than the average post-recessionary loss (-6,100 jobs).

**Professional and Business Services (PBS)**


lost 7,200 jobs over the month (-1.8%), below the post-recessionary average loss of 10,400 jobs. Within PBS, Administrative and Waste Services (-4,700 jobs) lost the most followed by Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (-2,700 jobs). Management of Companies and Enterprises gained 200 jobs. Employment Services within Administrative and Waste Service lost the most (-4,000 jobs). The Employment Services loss was the lowest tabulated since 2002. Business Support Services also lost 1,100 jobs while Services to Buildings and Dwellings gained 300 jobs.

**Education and Health Services (EHS)** lost 2,400 jobs (-0.6%) over the month, less than the post-recessionary (’10-’14) average January loss of 4,600 jobs. The majority of losses were in Health Care (-2,100 jobs) while Social Assistance gained 200 jobs. The losses in Health Care were fewer than the post-recessionary (’10-’14) average loss of 3,100 jobs. Educational Services lost 500 jobs. Within Health Care, Ambulatory Health Care Services (-1,100 jobs), Hospitals (-300 jobs), and Nursing and Residential Care Facilities (-700 jobs) all lost jobs.

**Financial Services (FA)** lost 2,300 jobs (-1.2 %) over the month in January, fewer than the post-recession (’10-’14) average loss of 2,400 jobs. Finance and Insurance lost 900 jobs from losses in Credit Intermediation and Related Activities (-500 jobs), Insurance Carriers and Related Activities (-300 jobs) and Securities, Commodity Contracts (-100 jobs). Real Estate, and Rental and Leasing lost 1,400 jobs.

**Manufacturing** lost 1,400 jobs (-0.9%) over the month in January, above the post-recessionary (’10-’14) average loss of 1,000 jobs. Losses were predominantly in Durable Goods (-1,200 jobs) with a small loss in Nondurable Goods (-200 jobs).

**Information** lost 900 jobs (-2.1%) over the month, more than double the post-recessionary ('10-'14) average loss of 300 jobs.

**Natural Resources and Mining (NRM)** lost 200 jobs (-1.5%) over the month.

**Leisure and Hospitality (L&H)** was flat over the month. Other than 1996, this was the only January without a decline in employment. Gains in Accommodations and Food Services (400 jobs) were offset by losses in Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation (-400 jobs). Accommodations gained 400 jobs. Food Services and Drinking Places was flat over the month.


**Construction** added 100 jobs (0.1%) over the month. This is atypical for January over the month, which has had a post-recessionary ('10-'14) average loss of 3,400 jobs. Gains in Buildings Construction (300 jobs), were partially offset by losses in Heavy Construction (-100 jobs), and Specialty Trades (-100 jobs).

**Other Services** added 1,600 jobs (1.8%) over the month.

### Over the Year

Over the year in January, Arizona gained 64,000 (2.5%) Nonfarm jobs. The Private Sector added 68,000 jobs (3.2%) while Government lost 4,000 jobs (-1.0%). The primary driver of the Private Sector job gain was Education and Health Services which grew by 16,700 jobs over the year. It was followed by Professional & Business Services which gained 16,000 jobs. Seven of the eleven major sectors reported gains and four reported losses (**Figure 4**).

**Education and Health Services** added 16,700 jobs (4.5%) over the year. This over-the-year change was the largest since September 2008. Educational Services added 4,800 jobs. Health Care and Social Assistance grew by 11,900 jobs. The primary driver for gains in Health Care and Social Assistance was Health Care which added 9,500 jobs. Within Health Care, Ambulatory Health Care Services gained the most (6,200 jobs), followed by Hospitals (2,700 jobs), and Nursing and Residential Care Facilities (600 jobs).

**Professional and Business Services** gained 16,000 jobs (4.3%) over the year. All subsectors experienced gains. Administrative and Support and Waste Services added the most (14,200 jobs), primarily from Employment Services (9,500 jobs). Smaller gains were also reported in Business Support Services (2,800 jobs) and Services to Buildings and Dwellings (1,400 jobs). Professional, Scientific and Technical Services grew by 1,200 jobs and Management of Companies and Enterprises by 600 jobs over the year.

**Leisure and Hospitality** gained 13,600 jobs (4.9%). This over-the-year change was the strongest since March 2006. Arts, Entertainment and Recreation

added 3,300 jobs, the largest gain on record ('90-'15). Accommodations and Food Services added 10,300 jobs, mostly from Food Services and Drinking Places which gained 8,700 jobs. Accommodations added 1,600 jobs.

**Trade, Transportation, and Utilities** gained 10,300 jobs (2.1%) over the year. Within Trade, Retail Trade accounted for all job growth with 6,300 jobs added. Motor Vehicles and Parts (1,300 jobs), General Merchandise (1,700 Jobs), Building Material, Garden Supply (700 Jobs), Furniture and Home Furnishings (600 jobs), Food and Beverage (400 jobs), all recorded gains while Clothing and Accessories lost 600 jobs. Utilities experienced no change over the year while Transportation and Warehousing added 4,000 jobs, which resulted in a net gain of 4,000 jobs in Transportation, Warehousing & Utilities.

**Other Services** gained 6,700 jobs (7.8%) over the year. This was the largest over-the-year gain since June 2006, as this sector has tended towards shedding jobs since 2007.

**Financial Activities** added 3,300 jobs (1.8%) over the year. Gains were reported in Finance and Insurance which added 3,400 jobs and Real Estate and Rental and Leasing lost 100 jobs. Within Finance and Insurance, gains were from Insurance Carriers and Related Activities (2,900 jobs), and Securities, Commodity Contracts (1,300 jobs). Credit Intermediation and Related Activities lost 800 jobs.

**Construction** added 2,400 jobs (1.9%) over the year. Job gains in Specialty Trades (3,900 jobs; 4.7%) were partially offset by losses in Heavy and Civil Engineering Construction (-1,100) and Construction of Buildings (-400).

**Government** jobs were reduced by 4,000 (-1.0%) over the year. State Government (2,600 jobs) experienced over the year job gains. This growth was driven by an increase in State Government Education (2,300 jobs). Local Government (-6,300 jobs) had job shedding over the year which was primarily from a reduction in Local Government Education (-6,000 jobs).

**Manufacturing** (-800 jobs), **Information** (-100 jobs), and **Natural Resources and Mining** (-100 jobs) had job losses over the year.

## Summary

Over the month, Trade, Transportation and Utilities had the largest job loss (-18,100 jobs), followed by Government (-12,500 jobs) and Professional and Business Services (-7,200 jobs) sectors. Losses in January were also reported in the sectors of: Education and Health Services (-2,400 jobs), Financial Activities (-2,300 jobs), Manufacturing (-1,400 jobs) Information (-900 jobs) and Natural Resources and Mining (-200 jobs). Leisure and Hospitality was flat over the month while Other Services (1,600 jobs) and Construction (100 jobs) added jobs.

Arizona added 64,000 Nonfarm jobs (2.5%) over the year in January. The Private Sector added jobs (68,000 jobs; 3.2%) while Government (-4,000 jobs; 1.0%) lost jobs over the year. Seven of the eleven major sectors reported gains and four reported losses. The primary gains in the Private Sector came from Education and Health Services (16,700 jobs), Professional and Business Services (16,000 Jobs), and Leisure and Hospitality (13,600 Jobs) sectors. Within Leisure and Hospitality, the Arts, Entertainment and Recreation sector experienced the largest over the year change (3,300 jobs) on record ('90-'15). Other sectors with job gains included Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (10,300 jobs), Other Services (6,700 jobs), Financial Activities (3,300 jobs), and Construction (2,400 jobs). Manufacturing (-800 jobs), Information (-100 jobs), and Natural Resource and Mining (-100 jobs) sectors lost jobs over the year in January.

### **Annual Benchmarking Revisions (CES - Establishment Survey Data)**

Every year prior to the release of the January estimates, the Current Employment Statistics program (CES) revises previous estimates by incorporating data from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW). QCEW is a Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) program which provides a quarterly count of employment which covers approximately 98% of U.S. jobs, based on Unemployment Insurance records. Information on the remaining 2% of employment is obtained from other sources, and the QCEW data is adjusted to obtain a 100% count of employment.

The replacement of CES estimates with adjusted data from the QCEW program is called **benchmarking**, and the new employment figures are often referred to as **benchmarked data**. Quarters for which QCEW data is not yet available are re-estimated using the latest available sample data. Last year, the revision process used QCEW employment counts from April 2012 through September 2013.

Arizona and sub-state area CES employment figures from April 2013 through September 2014 have been updated using the adjusted QCEW employment counts. Estimates for October 2014 through December 2014 have been replaced with new estimates. In addition, small historical corrections were incorporated into the data from January 1990 to March 2013.

### **Changes observed due to these revisions**

Arizona's Nonfarm employment was revised upward for both 2013 and 2014. The 2013 revision was relatively higher compared to 2014. According to the revised numbers, Arizona had an average of 2,520,600 jobs in 2013. This translates to a 2.3% increase from 2012, an upward revision of **5,400 jobs or 0.2% (see Figure 5)**. The 2014 estimate was revised to 2,568,400 jobs for Arizona, an upward revision of **400 jobs or 0.0% (see Figure 7)**. Despite the small upward revision in 2014, the annual average percentage gain dropped from 2.1% to 1.9%. This drop, however, occurred as a result of larger gains in 2013 than was initially reported. Revisions prior to 2013 were primarily in Wholesale and Retail Trade as a result of reclassification with very small changes in other sectors.

In 2013, annual average employment was revised upward for Professional and Business Services, Leisure and Hospitality, Construction, Government, Information, Trade, Transportation and Utilities, and Manufacturing. Revisions in Other Services were not strong enough to change the annual average employment. Education and Health Services, Financial Activities, and Natural Resources and Mining sectors were revised downward (**see Figures 5 & 6**).

In 2014, annual average employment was revised upward for Construction, Trade, Transportation and Utilities, Leisure and Hospitality, Information, and Manufacturing. Sectors revised downward included Education and Health Services, Financial Activities, Professional and Business Services, Natural Resources and Mining, and Other Services (**see Figures 7 & 8**).



**2013 Pre- & Post-Benchmark Change**







**2014 Pre- & Post-Benchmark Change**




