Occupation codes ending in 000 (e.g. 11-1000, 11-2000, 11-3000, etc.) are a summation of all the occupations listed below them.

Annual wages were calculated by multiplying hourly wages by 2080 (52 weeks X 40 hours / week); for those occupations where there is no hourly wage, the annual wage was calculated directly from the survey data. Hourly wages for occupations where workers typically work fewer than 2,080 hours per year are not available.

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
